**FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK**

Mending Wall

Robert Frost

*Something there is that doesn't love a wall,  
 That . . . spills the upper boulders in the sun,  
 And makes gaps even two can pass abreast.*

*The work of hunters is another thing:  
 I have come after them and made repair  
 Where they have left not one stone on a stone,  
 But they would have the rabbit out of hiding,  
 To please the yelping dogs.*

*The gaps I mean,  
 No one has seen them made or heard them made,  
 But at spring mending-time we find them there.  
 I let my neighbor know beyond the hill;  
 And on a day we meet to walk the line  
 And set the wall between us once again.*

*We keep the wall between us as we go.  
 To each the boulders that have fallen to each.  
 And some are loaves and some so nearly balls  
 We have to use a spell to make them balance: . . .  
 He says only, 'Good fences make good neighbors.'*

We at UUFBR are in a mending time. On Monday May 2<sup>nd</sup>, we discovered that we had been robbed. \$1,691.30 in cash was taken from the office safe, \$300 in petty cash, straggler UNICEF boxes and Publix gift cards was taken from The RE office, 2

cameras and Rev. Harris' lap top were also gone. All the checks and the paperwork from the May 1<sup>st</sup> morning collection for the storm victims and the ordination collection For the Living Tradition Fund were left behind.

The police were called. Two officers arrived and did all they could. It will remain an open investigation. There were no obvious signs of a break in, but a door could have been jimmed without being broken. In a building like ours security is a shared affair. Many folks have keys to the front door, and many doors can unintentionally be left closed but not fully latched. We probably will never know how the thief got in. We can assume that he, she or they, had plenty of time, to pop the locks gaining access to the offices, retrieving the safe key from it's hiding place, opening the safe, taking the cash out of the envelopes, neatly returning the checks and the paperwork, locking up the safe again and replacing the key. These details suggest that it was not an anonymous stranger. Whoever it was knew enough about us to know where to look, and may have known enough to guess that this particular Sunday night might be worth the risk. And it was, with 2 services that day, and a full house at the Ordination, there was more cash than usual.

Our loss can't be measured in dollars. There are feelings of vulnerability and betrayal. How could anyone "dis a church" of all places? There's a fraying of trust. As news of the robbery spread from the office to the leadership, people came to Gloria and I, keys in hand, and said "Do you want these back?" No one in their right mind would have suspected any of these folks. Each one of them does much to make this place all it is. I hope deep down they know that. Their offer was a way to heal that bruised trust, a spell to make things balance." This theft was not due to any negligence on the part of staff or any volunteers. All our money handling and security procedures were followed, as they always are. The collections were counted by 2 people and a slip filled out. Gloria opened the safe so all the envelopes could be put in and then locked it up again. She hid the key in the office as she has for years. Sunday night Doug Hughes, Vada Mossavat and I were the last to leave, and we locked up the building.

The gap in this wall was only "the work of hunters" who "would have the rabbit out of hiding, to please the yelping dogs." I do wonder why. I wonder what

hunger set off this hunt? I wonder if this rabbit was big enough to quiet the dogs? I hope so. I hope the problem that made us a temptation is now truly solved, but I suspect that is not the case. Somebody who has walked in and out of our doors is troubled, is keeping it a secret, doesn't know how to ask for help, or doesn't believe help is possible. This theft will only add shame and guilt. And that makes me sad. We could have been put to better use.

The amount our thief gained was not huge. Money troubles can squeeze so hard that \$10 seems like a million. But it's not. And even though of late we always seem to be worried about money around here, the few thousand the thief stole is not an untouchable sum. We have made loans out of the discretionary fund almost that large. I have seen this congregation gather gifts, quietly, unofficially for families we knew were in financial straits. That's who we are, who we'd like to be. We could have been of more help.

The robbery will lead us to change things. Some of the doors have new locks. The safe key will no longer be kept on the premises overnight. I've seen more of us double back and check that the door we just went through not only closed but actually locked. Without anyone asking, folks have offered contributions to make up what was stolen. The Endowment Committee gave a grant to replace the money that would have gone to the UUA's Storm Fund and The Living Tradition Fund. These are all good, are all signs of strength and care of a people willing to "meet to walk the line and set the wall between us once again". Witness to the belief that it is not the walls themselves that make good neighbors, but the willingness to work together to make things whole.

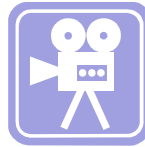
While returning from Orlando to Tampa following the April, District Annual meeting I asked my traveling companion, Judy Lehman, "just retired" Florida District Board member what might be a good topic for the May Trustee Tidbits and she suggested "being in it for the long haul". As I thought about her suggestion I realized this was an underlying theme of our talented guest presenters, Janice Marie Johnson, Multi-cultural Growth Director (UUA), and Sarah Dan Jones, President of the UU Musicians Network who led us through two questions: Who Are We? Where are we Going?, using some of our favorite UU hymns, interspersed with dialogue between them and some interaction with their audience. If you were there you know the excellence of their time with us. We lifted our voices in song and they opened their hearts and made us pay attention to the words of several of our UU hymns. Both of them, despite the sometimes negative emotions engendered by the selected hymns, are "in it for the long haul"!

Are you in it for the long haul? By this I mean despite "thick and thin" in your congregation do you support our faith with your time, energy, and generous financial commitment? Or are you one who attend Sunday service when it "suits" you, and contributes in the many ways necessary to sustain a healthy congregation, as long as your congregational leaders are making decisions with which you agree? There are many times, I am sure, that your congregational leadership is not "behaving" in the manner you would direct them BUT does this mean you criticize behind their backs and withdraw from your congregation? Or do you come forth to the leadership and explain your concern (s) with a legitimate conversation?

Being part of a religious community is like being part of a good personal partnership or marriage. Intimate relationships require a special set of attitudes and expectations on the part of the participants. If we UUs approach the relationship with the mentality of "What's in it for me"? we are most certainly to become disappointed and fail. Sadly, our societal attitude has mirrored the "what's-in-it-for-me" reflection, with a consumerism mind-set. But as a member of your congregation is this the value you perceive? You are not consumers in the ordinary sense. Your congregation is an investment in so much we consider important in our faith...you are a co-owner of what happens in your congregation, just as the parties in a partnership or

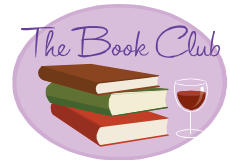
marriages see themselves as partners with a joint share in the success of the enterprise.

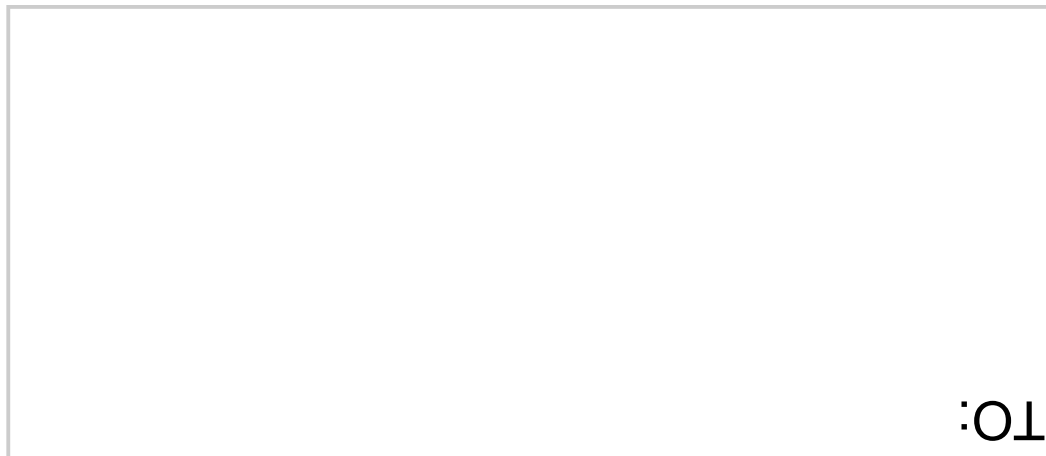
